World Book Day

The School will celebrate World Book Day on Thursday March 1st. We would love children to bring in their favourite book to share with friends. Money collected for dressing up will be used to support READATHON-a book charity that support children in hospital (including Bristol and Gloucester) through providing books and storytellers. School closure

Increase in scarlet fever - from the Director of Public Health, GCC

There is a recent national increase in notifications of scarlet fever. Scarlet fever is a common childhood infection. We would like to take this opportunity to remind you of the signs, symptoms and the actions to be taken. <u>Signs and symptoms of scarlet fever</u>: The early symptoms of scarlet fever include sore throat, headache, fever, nausea and vomiting. After 12 to 48 hours the characteristic red, pinhead rash develops, typically first appearing on the chest and stomach, then rapidly spreading to other parts of the body, and giving the skin a sandpaper-like texture. The scarlet rash may be harder to spot on the skin of some Black and Asian people, although the 'sandpaper' feel should be present. Patients typically have flushed cheeks and pallor around the mouth. This may be accompanied by a 'strawberry tongue'. As the child improves peeling of the skin can occur. <u>Infection control advice</u>: Children and adults with suspected scarlet fever **should not attend** school / work for **24** hours after the commencement of appropriate antibiotic treatment. Good hygiene practice such as hand washing remains the most important step in preventing and controlling spread of infection.

Traffic

Due to reported speeding, the local police have monitored the speed of traffic around the front of school and the lane. They have informed us this will continue to ensure children and adults who walk to school are safe. Many thanks for driving responsibly in this busy area.

Governors

We are delighted that Katy Smith has joined our Governing team as a co-opted representative. Katy has strong skills and has already shown her commitment to our school through chairing the PA committee successfully in the past. We are all looking forward to working with her in the months to come.

The Governor team have undertaken a safety walk of the inside of the building recently and worked with the staff to monitor safeguarding procedures and curriculum subjects last month. We thank them for their time and continued support.
